World Book Day 2022






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Silhouette Project

Year 8 have been studying Light Waves in science. Shadows are created when an opaque object blocks rays of light. 8J and 8BL have used their understanding of light to create silhouettes of their faces. The images are going to be used in a Thames Valley Trust project for the Queen's Jubilee. We are creating the artworks in collaboration with our partner schools in Addis Ababa along the theme of "Rivers of Hope". We used pictures of light reflecting off water as part of the project. The silhouettes are supposed to represent the Queen's head that we see on postage stamps. If our designs are chosen they will be displayed in London over the summer.

This project links to SDG6, Clean Water as we are concerned by the amount of pollution entering our rivers.





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Democracy in Action!

Key Stage 3 had the opportunity today to participate in 'Make your Mark' - a national event for all young people aged 11-18 . They voted in 3 separate areas - Youth Parliament, Youth Cabinet and a topic they care about. We have 8 candidates standing in the Northumberland elections and wish them the very best.

Well done to our indoor cricket team who competed in an area competition at Wentworth at the end of last half term. A combination of skilful playing and determination saw the girls through to the final against Ovingham.

This team have been working on their cricket technique, with specialist coaches, in our Enrichment Programme on a Friday afternoon.





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'Kingdom By The Sea' Display

Mrs Child's Year 5 English set are reading Robert Westall's 'Kingdom by the Sea' set in WW2.

The protagonist carries an attache case with him on his adventures which contained all the essential documents a family would have taken into a shelter in case of an air raid.

For homework the pupils were set a task where they needed to reproduce the documents within the attache case, including ration books, school reports, insurance documents and bank savings books. The class out did themselves creating the whole case and also finding and making other contents from the novel such as a wedding photo, school photo and Dad's best wristwatch.





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Pop Art Display

Some of our talented Year 8 artists have been working on an amazing piece of art which will be displayed on outside wall within the school grounds. The work is based around our school's values with a 'Pop Art' style. So much time, talent and commitment has gone into this and I am sure you will agree ... it looks great!





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Lego Race Cars

We were delighted to launch a new topic to our Enrichment Programme this term. The children have been building and racing remote control Lego cars.

They have constructed, customized and raced their cars, as well as designing a race track on which to compete. The last session of half term was the grand final where teams competed against each other and the overall champions were crowned.

The group have had lots of fun in the project as well as learning the importance of effective teamwork and communication.





Life In The Middle Ages - Newcastle Castle Trip

As part of our Year 7 History topic of 'Life in the Middle Ages', pupils had the opportunity to visit Newcastle Castle and Keep.

We learnt about the history of the castle, how it changed over time and some of its more famous guests.

Pupils also had the chance to handle artefacts from the time to help give them a greater understanding of life in the era.





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Fashion Upcycling Project

Pupils enjoyed up-cycling second hand garments during our KS3 Enrichment Project to give them a new life.

Tops were transformed into skirts, baby clothes decorated and bags created from clothing.

The Pupils demonstrated a great degree of creativity and skill throughout this project.





Year 5 Lunchtime Computer Club

Year 5 lunchtime Computer Club was well attended and certainly kept Mr Johnston and our Year 8 helpers very busy!

Our focus recently has been cyber security. We were testing a new learning tool called 'Cyber Sprinters' from the National Cyber Security Centre to improve online safety for kids aged 7-11 years old.

Year 5 were completing the puzzles to test and improve their cyber security skills.





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Weather & Climate Club

The Year 7 Weather & Climate Club have presented their project on heavy rainfall events at the Royal Society student conference. The session was held virtually with schools from Yorkshire and Lancashire. It was an excellent experience for the team, sharing their Citizen Science work and having to answer questions from Fellows of the Society!

Recently they have also had an online meeting with Professor Hayley Fowler, Professor of Climate Change Impacts in the School of Engineering at Newcastle University.

She is really impressed with the work the team are doing and has invited them to see the SUDS (sustainable urban design system) labs in her department. The #PartnershipGrant project with the University links to SDG4 Quality Education, SDG13 ClimateAction and SDG15 Life on Land.





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Wooden Key Plaques

In Design Technology, Year 5 have been designing and making a wooden key plaque.

Mrs Walker-Thomas is very pleased with their work, considering this is the first time they have used tools like a Tenon Saw and Pillar Drill.

Many of them said these were going to be gifts... I do hope we haven't spoilt the surprise!





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RE Enrichment Homework

It all started with the Spring 1 Enrichment homework... This was the task: In response to our unit on charity, the pupils imagined that they had £150 to spend. Their task was to create a collage of the gifts they might buy to help improve the life of a family or families. The response and standard of the homework was amazing.

By chance, I got talking to some of the Year 7 boys at breaktime and they said that it would be easy to make the money real by simply having a non-school uniform day. After a quick chat with Mr Johnston and Mrs Brown, it was agreed!


The total sum raised by the efforts of the whole school was: **£393.58!**

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Imagine that you had £150 to spend. Your task is to create a collage of the gifts you might buy to help improve the life of a family or families.

My family. (imaginary)

The family I am buying for live in Ethiopia. They do not have clean water or cleaning supplies and are quite poor. The mother works hard to make dinner while the father goes out and helps people with jobs to earn some money. The children go to school 3 days a week and are looking for more money to go to school more often. Their parents are working hard to feed the family and to afford their children's education. Their names are:



Abeni - Mother of the family
Abdullah - Father of the family
Zuri - Eldest Daughter (13)
Malika - Younger Daughter (9)
Hakim - Youngest Son (6)

I would spend my £150 on:



Clean water
£30.00

Christian Aid-

Clean water is important for my family to keep them healthy because they have to go looking for water down in the muddy stream which is also sewage water where they can catch diseases like skin infections and chest infections. This will reduce them worrying about where they will get their water from.

£150 - £30 = £120



Period kit
£12.00

Action Aid-

I would buy 3 period kits, 1 for Zuri, 1 for Malika, and 1 for Abeni. It is important that they have the right supplies while on their Period so they don't have to worry about having no pads.

£12 x 3 = £36

£120 - £36 = £84



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A pair of chickens

£8.00

Christian Aid-

I would also buy 4 chickens, so that everyday they can have eggs for breakfast and don't have to worry about where their food is coming from. Chickens lay around 1-2 eggs a day, so that would be enough to feed them all.

$$£8 \times 2 = £16$$

$$£84 - £16 = £68$$



Seeds of hope and tools of change

£15.00

Christian Aid-

I would buy my family some seeds and farming tools so they can always grow their own food and so that they can have some fruit and vegetables on the side of their plate along with the egg. Growing their own fruit means that they will have a lifetime of food instead of giving them a food bundle, which will only last a few days/weeks until it runs out, since it does not regrow.

$$£68 - £15 = £53$$



School backpack

£10.00

Action Aid-

A school backpack would be a good idea for the children to carry all of their school supplies in, as well as a water bottle for them throughout the day.

$$£10 \times 3 = £30$$

$$£53 - £30 = £23$$



Blankets

£19.00

Action Aid-

Blankets would provide them with warmth in the night and can be used for a bed in their shelter. Blankets could be used for when one of the children gets sick or has a disease. (if that happens)

$$£23 - £19 = £4$$
